FAVORITE ZUCCHINI BREAD

MIX: 3 eggs (beaten)

1 cup vegetable oil

2 tsp. vanilla

2 cups of sugar

ADD: 2 cups shredded zucchini

1 8 oz. can of crushed pineapple (drained)

3 cups of flour

2 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. baking powder

1 1/12 tsp. cinnamon

1 cup sweetened coconut flakes; can use unsweetened if you prefer

2 LOAVES: Pour batter into 2 metal bread baking pans, greased and floured

(We actually put a teflon sheet on the bottom of the pan which Paul cut to fit because the dough tends to stick to the pans.)

Bake at 350 degrees. Do not undercook. Test for "doneness" with a toothpick. Remove bread from pans within 5 minutes of removal from oven and place on metal screen to cool and dry.

Holiday Basket Preparations *By Kathy Farwell*

Over the summer, food pantry volunteers have completed several of the tasks needed to be done in preparation for the upcoming holiday basket distribution:

- ~ Counted, opened and flattened 75 plastic bags ready for packing hot dogs, cold cuts, margarine and cheese
- \sim Numbered 3 sets of paper bags, 1-75; one set for toiletries and two sets as inserts to 75 totes that hold the dry good items and loaves of bread
- ~ Inventoried 75 totes (added any missing #s, culled any in poor condition)
- ~ Numbered 75 bottles of laundry detergent
- ~ Steadily collected 75 EGG boxes from Piggly Wiggly, numbered and stacked— to pack with juice, eggs and produce, usually potatoes, carrots and fresh fruit

Hundreds of food items have also been counted, boxed and set aside ready to fill \pm 75 totes approximately 10 days before distribution day (set in collaboration with school support staff \sim one week before Thanksgiving, Winter Break and Spring Break.)

Once the distribution dates are set, we set a tentative date to order produce 3 weeks prior; fill toiletry bags 2-3 weeks ahead; * pack totes 1-2 weeks before; *pick up and pack produce 2 days before; and on the morning of Distribution Day, pick up eggs, meet at church at 7:00 am and pack all the cold food to be ready for pickup/distribution.

Clients check in to receive their baskets beginning at 7:45. A small but mighty group of volunteers load carts with a food tote, toiletry bag and cold food box for each client or school family. School staff arrives by 8:00 to begin their deliveries to families in the community who have signed up for this service and have a student at Taylor Prairie School, Cottage Grove School, Granite Ridge School, Glacial Drumlin School, Monona Grove School, or MG21.

* These tasks are completed far in advance for a couple of reasons. By packing well ahead, we can purchase any needed items and pack another set of components if any additional families request food assistance. Because of the sheer quantity of items that need to be packed, we find that breaking up these large tasks on different days with different groups of volunteers is more manageable and less daunting. Also, for a few years now a young man and his coach collect the donated items from the barrel at the Piggly Wiggly and bring them to the pantry on Monday mornings to be checked and shelved. We (the three of us: Patti, Kim, Kathy) are there to welcome him and assign other tasks as needed. With us being there every Monday morning, we can complete small chunks of the multi-step packing process well before distribution day.



Third Grade Food Drive

Since the late 1980's, the Cottage Grove area 3rd graders and staff have hosted a food drive for the Cottage Grove Food Pantry. In conjunction with their Social Studies

Unit of Community Services, the students are introduced to and learn about various services that are provided within the community of Cottage Grove.

Every year, the third-grade teacher coordinator extends an invitation to the pantry coordinator or other representative to talk about the food pantry to all the third-grade classes. Information is shared about the pantry, what it is, where it's located, who

can use it and what kinds of food we accept. This presentation initiated the start of a weeklong drive for food and toiletry items. At the end of the week a large group of volunteers waited in the fellowship hall as each 3rd grade class, every 20 minutes,

walked from Cottage Grove School with their bags of food.

Once at church, the students gathered around the growing mountain of donations and

learned additional information about how their collection benefits the community. Before

heading back to school, they were given a tour of the pantry shelves and cabinets.

That was the format before 2021. When Granite Ridge School (grades 3,4,5) was built, the 3rd graders could no longer make that trek to church, so pantry volunteers now pick up the donations at week's end. Although the logistics of this week-long event have changed over the past few years, the result is always remarkable. The spirit of

teamwork and generosity is very evident in the quantity of donations we receive.

We look forward to this year's food drive set for the week of October 6-10!

Per Capita Why?

In addition to your Annual Pledge to Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church each member is assigned a Per Capita amount to be paid to the Presbytery to support all of their activities throughout the year. This year's Per Capita is \$40.00 per member. As of June 30th, only 46% of the total Bryn Mawr pays out to the Presbytery has been received.

The Church Treasurer has already paid our Annual Contribution to the Presbytery even though we haven't collected even half of that total to date. The amount due from our church is based on our membership at the end of the prior year.

John Knox Presbytery is made up of 55 congregations that are doing ministry, with each other and for each other in ways they simply couldn't do alone. Every Presbyterian shares in the benefit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and the expenses associated with coordinating and performing their functions are shared by every member as well.

To summarize, your Session has agreed to pay John Knox Presbytery our requested Per Capita for 2025 whether or not we have received those funds from our members.

So, if you have already paid your Per Capita for 2025, Thank You! If you haven't paid it yet the Session would greatly appreciate you doing so sooner rather than later this year.
